indifference to the issue has hastened the erosion of these community centres. "A majority of old takias of Lahore are now history," says Munawar of Mochi Gate.

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Viamshala, Takia Gowshala (outside Taxali Gate on Katcha Mohni Road).

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Takias being exclusive places, some of these may in the past have been used by groups of people for activities that could only be carried out away from public gaze. But with the increase in crime over the years, many among these have come to be regarded as serving only one purpose: that of a safe haven for criminals of all kinds. As these were public places, these takias could be much more easily grabbed by the qabza groups and gam-bling mafias. That these takias can return to Lahore in their original form seems impossible. But as they say, hope never dies and unreasonable, utterly unacceptable demands continue to be made. "The authorities should rebuild and wherever possible restore these social institutions of the city," says Iobal Pervaiz.
